1	<b>Opposition to H.B. 327</b>
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3 4	WHEREAS, the 134 <sup>th</sup> General Assembly of the Ohio House of Representatives has put forth House Bill #327 during its regular session; and
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6 7	WHEREAS, the bill is designed to: "amend sections 3314.03 and 3326.11 and to enact sections 3313.6027 and 4113.35 of the Revised Code to prohibit school districts, community schools,
8	STEM schools, and state agencies from teaching, advocating, or promoting divisive concepts";
9	and
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11	WHEREAS, this bill prohibits the teaching of divisive concepts then states in section 3D that
12	"nothing in this section shall be construed to prohibit discussing or using supplemental
13 14	instructional materials, as part of a larger course of academic instruction, to teach divisive concepts in an objective manner and without endorsement"; and
14 15	concepts in an objective manner and without endorsement, and
16	WHEREAS, this bill states that instruction must be impartial regarding how these divisive
17	concepts are taught; therefore
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19	BE IT RESOLVED, the Ohio Federation of Teachers (OFT) opposes this legislation for the
