RESOLUTION REAFFIRMING THE NEED TO MAKE VOTING ACCESSIBLE TO ALL ELIGIBLE VOTERS IN OHIO
WHEREAS, voting is a right guaranteed to American citizens by the United States Constitution; and
WHEREAS, voting is a foundational right of democracy; and
WHEREAS, in an interview with The Daily Record on January 14, 2021, Ohio Secretary of State Frank LaRose stated, "I think we ran the most successful election we've ever had. You can quantify that. You can show that in numbers," in response to the November 2020 General Election; and
WHEREAS, despite the level of security declared by the Ohio Secretary of State, HB 294 (Election Modernization and Security Act) was introduced in the Ohio House of Representatives on May 6, 2021, by sponsors Republican State Representatives Bill Seitz of Cincinnati and Sharon Ray of Wadsworth; and
WHEREAS, HB 294 allows only 1 ballot drop box location in each of Ohio's 88 counties, reduces the amount of time drop boxes are available to 10 days before an election day, shortens the absentee ballot request deadlines from 3 days before an election to 10 days before, cancels early voting the Monday before an election, imposes a 3- tier identification system, prohibits prepaid postage on absentee ballots, and requires the disqualification of ballots not sealed in 2

envelopes; and

WHEREAS, these measures would mostly affect seniors, students, military personnel, low-income residents, and rural communities in negative ways; and

32	BE IT RESOLVED, the Ohio Federation of Teachers (OFT), strongly opposes all attempts at

35	BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, the OFT will advocate for legislation and policy changes that
36	make voting more secure and accessible to all eligible Ohio voters, regardless of political party

make voting more secure and accessible to all eligible Ohio voters, regardless of political party affiliation, race, religion, gender, gender expression, sexual orientation, etc. including, but not limited to:

- a. Improving access for senior, student, low-income, and rural Ohio voters by allowing counties to have multiple drop boxes and multiple early voting centers.
- b. Adopting Agency Voter Verification and Registration (VVR), thereby improving the accuracy of voter rolls by automatically registering and updating registration for eligible citizens when they interact with state government agencies, unless they opt out.
- c. Passing legislation regarding online absentee ballot requests and permitting voters to submit online absentee ballot applications.
- d. Securing voter registration systems, reducing the likelihood of registration errors that would disenfranchise voters, providing Ohioans the confidence that their registrations are secure and accurate, and giving county boards of elections the tools to carry out their jobs effectively and efficiently; and

BE IT FINALLY RESOLVED, the OFT reaffirms that voting is a fundamental right of all Ohio citizens and will continue to promote voter participation through all communication outlets currently available.
